



Message from the Outgoing Board Chair

Over the past three decades, my work in public service has focused on the evolving relationship between state and local government, energy, the environment, and the economy. I've had the privilege of participating in two transformative shifts: the restructuring of monopoly utilities to enable competitive wholesale and retail power markets with customer choice of supply, and the rise of Community Power—to empower local governments to lead the way in shaping energy solutions for their residents.

The formation of the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire (CPCNH) stands as one of the most meaningful chapters in this journey. What began in 2016 as an idea in the City of Lebanon—where the City Council designated its energy advisory committee as the electric aggregation committee under RSA 53-E—evolved into an ad-hoc organizing group by 2019, united by a shared vision of local energy self-determination. That effort has since grown into a statewide movement. Today, CPCNH is a member-governed nonprofit serving more than 190,000 customers, reducing costs, enhancing resilience, and delivering real value to our communities.

It has been an honor to help build this Coalition from the ground up and to serve alongside so many dedicated leaders. I am proud of the foundation we've laid, and I'm confident that CPCNH will continue to lead with purpose, integrity, and innovation.



Administration

Member Services

Oversees engagement with Members, the media, and the public. Responsibilities include implementing Electric Aggregation Plans and ensuring regulatory compliance (Join, Plan, Launch); marketing and communications; customer service, retail data, and key account management; and implementation of certain programs developed by the Projects & Programs Department (Operate).

Projects & Programs

Develops and implements strategies to bring cost-effective new distributed energy resources online to serve CPCNH members and to create innovative rate structures to help manage member loads. Oversees CPCNH's REC procurement and provides technical assistance to members.

Regulatory & Legislative Affairs

Advocates on behalf of consumer interests and the collective voice of its Community Power municipal Members in regulatory proceedings before the Public Utilities Commission and the New Hampshire Department of Energy and legislative priorities before the New Hampshire General Court.

Power Resources

Handles energy portfolio analytics and risk management, load forecasting, cost modeling, rate recommendations, and oversight for financial operations. Manages wholesale energy market participation, including power procurement and hedging.

2024 Key Highlights



2024 Annual Meeting

CPCNH held its **third Annual Membership and Board of Directors meeting** on April 25, 2024, at the Susan B. McLane Audubon Center in Concord and virtually. Members voted on proposed amendments to the Joint Powers Agreement and By-laws, elected Directors to new terms, and received reports from staff and leadership on CPCNH's operations, financial position, and policy initiatives.

Member Services

Membership Growth: Increased CPCNH membership from 23 to 68 municipalities and counties through governing body adoption of the Joint Powers Agreement.

Program Expansion: Launched 36 local Community Power programs and added 9 communities through two county-based initiatives—bringing service to 45 new communities in 2024.

Service Delivery: Maintained high-quality service during rapid expansion, as CPCNH grew from 83,000 to nearly 200,000 customer accounts.

Projects & Programs

New REC Program: Launched CPCNH's Renewable Energy Certificate (REC) Aggregation Program to purchase renewable energy certificates from member-owned systems and retire them in support of CPCNH's electricity products.

Major Solar Project: Finalized a term sheet and Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) for a 5 MW photovoltaic (PV) project—set to be one of New Hampshire's largest once completed in 2026—that will be structured as a Group Net Metering arrangement to maximize member value.

Project Pipeline Strategy: Designed an annual solicitation program to build a steady pipeline of distributed generation projects across the state.


Regulatory & Legislative Affairs

Member Action: Nearly 300 leaders across 40+ Member communities took over 300 advocacy actions in support of CPCNH's public policy agenda to advance competitive energy markets and represent consumer and community interests.

Regulatory Impact: Advocated for practical solutions in multiple Public Utilities Commission and New Hampshire Department of Energy proceedings to address the roadblocks that prevent CPCNH from serving net metering customers and offering other cost-saving innovative rates and programs.

Legislative Impact: Strengthened Member engagement in crafting the *NH Energy Forward Act*—designed to empower NH customers and communities to source more of their energy from local energy, access innovative rate and program options, and lower costs for all Granite Staters.

Energy Products Defined

Granite Basic: Granite Basic is CPCNH's default electricity product. It meets New Hampshire's Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS) by including the minimum required percentage of renewable energy — currently 25.2% (March 2025) — through the purchase of qualified Renewable Energy Certificates (RECs).

Granite Plus: Granite Plus increases renewable content to approximately 33% by purchasing additional New Hampshire RPS-compliant RECs, with a preference for sourcing from in-state renewable generators.

Clean 50: Clean 50 provides electricity with 50% renewable or carbon-free content. This option supports a cleaner energy mix through the voluntary purchase of additional RECs beyond the state minimum.

Clean 100: Clean 100 delivers 100% renewable or carbon-free electricity. All customer usage is matched with RECs and/or clean energy sources, enabling full environmental offset.

Local Option: The Local Option rate saves customers money while allowing communities to capitalize a fund to support local energy projects and programs to the benefit of its residents and businesses.


